Know Your Bylaws

PROHIBITIONS

An Owner shall not:

- (a) use his residence for any purpose which may be illegal or injurious to the reputation of the project.
- (b) make undue noise in or about any residence, common areas or common facilities.
- (c) keep any animals, livestock, fowl, or pets in his residence or the common property other than two dogs, or two cats or one cat and one dog.
- (d) feed any food substance to wildlife. Birdfeeders are not permitted with the exception of hummingbird feeders.
(amended, AGM, June 7, 2017)
- (e) compost any materials on their lot, whether in a commercial container or otherwise, unless required by a bylaw passed by the City of Chilliwack.

Back Gate Curb Fixed

And they said it would never happen !! The narrow exit from our back gates onto Chilliwack River Road had long raised safety concerns, particularly for vehicles and RVs attempting to turn right into oncoming traffic.

This issue was first identified about 3 years ago during the upgrade of Chilliwack River Road and the subsequent installation of the new curb near our back gate exit. When Mel Sandberg rejoined the BOD back then, he took it upon himself to start the conversation with the appropriate City of Chilliwack department to hopefully get this situation corrected. After many emails (even one to our mayor), phone calls, meetings, Mel's persistence, dedicated efforts and with help from Fred Mantel and Katherine Mathieson, it finally paid off with the city recognizing the safety concerns and danger that their badly placed curb could cause.

On November 25th through November 27th, we witnessed this project brought to a satisfactory completion which now allows our residents to make that right turn onto Chilliwack River Road in a safe and stress free manner.
